

Located in North Africa, the Sahara is the largest hot desert in the world. Geographically, the Sahara Desert covers as many as eleven different countries including Egypt, Libya, Tunisia, Algeria, Morocco, Western Sahara, Mauritania, Mali, Niger, Chad and Sudan, with an area of around 9.2 million square kilometres.

The term 'Sahara' has its origin in the Arabic language, meaning 'desert'. Predictably, it is one of the most consistently hottest places in the world.

On the other hand, it can drop below freezing point rapidly at nights. In general, the climate is hot, dry and windy. While it rarely rains in some parts, there are regions which do not see a drop of rain in years!

All this makes Sahara an inhospitable place to live. It is estimated that only less than 2.5 million people live in the region, despite its vastness.

The highest point in the desert is the volcano named Emi Koussi in Chad. Historians note that thousands of years ago, the Sahara Desert had enough water to let people live well.



Rishi Sunak, the 42-year-old investment banker-turned politician took charge as UK's first Hindu Prime Minister, the leader of the Conservative Party in a historic leadership run. He is the youngest British prime minister in 210 years.

Rishi Sunak was born on 12th May 1980 in Southampton, Hampshire, South East England to Indian parents Yashvir and Usha Sunak. His father was a general practitioner while his mother was a pharmacist who ran a local pharmacy. Sunak's grandparents were born in Punjab Province, British India, and emigrated to the UK in the 1960s from East Africa. Sunak is the eldest of three siblings. His brother Sanjay is a psychologist and his sister Rakhi works as the Head of Humanitarian, Peacebuilding, UN Funds and Programmes at the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office. Rishi Sunak tied the knot with Akshata Murthy in August 2009. The couple has two daughters. His wife is the daughter of Indian billionaire N.R. Narayana Murthy and serves as the director at Catamaran Ventures. She also runs her own fashion label and is among the wealthiest women in Britain. Sunak says, "I have been fortunate to enjoy a successful business career. From working in my mum's tiny chemist shop to my experience building large businesses, I have seen first-hand how politicians should support free enterprise and innovation to ensure our future prosperity".

In July 2019 he was appointed Chief Secretary to the Treasury, having entered Government service as the Minister for Local Government in January 2018. In February 2020, he had the honour to be appointed Chancellor of the Exchequer, a position he held until July 2022. On October 25, he was honoured and privileged to be appointed UK Prime Minister.

The volcanoes of the world are divided into three types on the basis of period of eruption. The volcanoes which erupt frequently and constantly the molten lavas, gases, ashes and fragmental materials, are known as active volcanoes. Most of the active volcanoes are found along the midoceanic ridges. All volcanoes do sign of activity for years together nor any type of indication for future eruptions. But they suddenly erupt very violently and cause enormous damage to human life and property.
